While the District already had a policy in place, revisions were made to comply with this legislation. A copy of the new/revised policy was included in the August newsletter.

The superintendent is responsible for organizing training for employees that includes how to recognize harassment and what to do in case a student is harassed. The training is also to include proven effective harassment prevention strategies.

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JR-SR HIGH SCHOOL

We are off to a busy start and I look forward to another great year. Let's start with some positive news. Our senior ACT scores have arrived, and the 30 seniors that took the test have shown the best scores in the last five years. Students are tested in English, Math, Reading, and Science and given an overall composite score. Our average composite score for the 30 seniors was 20.6. I am pleased with the positive improvement. Our next goal is to have our students achieve the state composite average of 22.3.

Homecoming 2007

This will be a year of change for our Homecoming activities. Mrs. Mitzelfelt and the Student Council are planning a great week of activities. Let's enjoy the activities and encourage all of our students to be involved in the positive reasons for Homecoming. During my summer reading I read an article titled, "What Principals Would Tell Parents to Help Parents Help Their Children." According to the survey of elementary and secondary principals, the number one response was:

Take time to talk with your children, and listen to what they have to say.

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TRAINING, cont'd

The District has contracted with Edu-Safe of Springfield, Missouri, to present a three-hour training session for all employees following the early dismissal on October 24. This session will begin at 1:00 PM and end at 4:00. Edu-Safe will be making presentations throughout the state during this school year. Following is the description of the training session our employees will receive.

Course Description: Regardless of socio economic level, educational achievement, or community awareness, bullying still persists to varying degrees in all schools. This problem can often go unchecked due to the fact that some students tend not to report these types of incidents to those in authority. The educational research is clear that when bullying occurs school climate and academic achievement are negative-

ly impacted. These negative effects will affect the perpetrator, victim, as well as the witnesses.

Recent educational studies indicate that many students believe that teachers and administrators are not interested in reducing the incidents of bullying on campus. If the student surveys are true indicators of student perceptions, then school staffs need to be provided staff development opportunities that will enhance their ability to recognize and respond to bullying behaviors, as well as communicate to students that it will not be tolerated. This workshop will provide school staff with the knowledge base, educational resources, and methodologies to significantly reduce and/or eliminate these types of anti-social behaviors.

Participants will receive instruction in the following:

- Assessing the scope of the bullying problem at the school
- Understanding the role of authority when addressing a bullying situation
- Recognizing and be able to convey to staff and faculty the indicators of bullying behaviors of students
- Identifying and responding to victims in an appropriate manner
- How to work with and teach bystanders the appropriate respons-
- Planning a comprehensive school wide program designed to address the effects of bullying on the perpetrator, victims, and witnesses
- Utilizing a research-based approach to managing this difficult and complex problem

HS PRINCIPAL, cont'd

- Department of Ed study: Average American mother spends less than 30 minutes a day talking to her children. Average American father – 15 minutes.
- Talk when your child comes home from school
- Make a point to talk 1:1 with each child, not always just group talk.
- Talk, sing, laugh, read, listen with your children.

Our lives are busy, but listening and talking to our children is very important to them. Take time, make time, to let your children know that what they have to say and share means a lot to you.

Cost Savings Plan for 2007-2008

Harold Hulleman, Superintendent

Last spring, I met with staff in all three buildings to elicit ideas for saving money in the District. More than twenty ideas were suggested. Of those suggestions, cost analyses of sixteen were developed.

These cost saving ideas were presented to the School Board in May. The following ideas were approved; the estimates of savings are listed below.

Reuse paper/obtain surplus paper from paper companies	\$ 580
Energy conservation (lights, heat)	\$ 3,742
Contract for summer mowing	\$ 7,100
Discontinue subscription to the Master Teacher	\$ 698
Send newsletters via email when possible	\$ 500
Lower classroom thermostat settings, lower more at night	\$ 3,843
Eliminate ski trips	\$ 760
Conduct staff development in district (no consultants)	\$ 4,200
Encourage home-school students to dual enroll	\$ 2,000

We expect cost savings of at least \$20,000 and have a goal of \$30,000. To accomplish this, we have established the following guidelines for staff:

- 1. If an area with incandescent or fluorescent lighting (for example: class-room, office, storage area) is to be vacant for 5 minutes or longer, turn off lights when you leave the area.
- 2. In your classroom or work area, make sure lights are turned off before recess, lunch, and after school.
- 3. Activate "sleep" features on computers and office equipment that power down when not in use for a while. Turn off equipment during longer periods of non-use to cut energy costs and improve longevity.
- 4. Only 5% of the energy used by incandescent light bulbs is used for light; the other 95% produces heat. Replace any incandescent bulbs with compact fluorescent bulbs; they use two-thirds less energy and last ten times longer.
- 5. Make sure books and furniture do not block vents in the classrooms.
- 6. Turn off the water in the bathroom when you are finished using it.
- 7. Report any water leaks to the principal or custodian.
- 8. Be sure exterior doors are closed during the heating season.
- 9. If an area with halogen lighting (for example: gymnasium, cafeteria) is to be vacant for 2 hours or longer, turn off lights when the area is vacated
- 10. If you are in the building on the weekends, be sure all lights are off when you leave. If you have students in the building for athletic activities, be sure to check the locker rooms and adjacent areas as students may use those areas without your knowledge. (Also, make sure all doors are closed and locked for security purposes.)
- 11. Do not turn on all lights in an area if only part of the area is to be used or if maximum lighting is not needed for the use.
- 12. Research studies indicate the optimal temperature for learning is 71-73 degrees Fahrenheit. Classroom thermostats are to be set at 72. Dress accordingly.

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Student Meal Accounts & Policies

District-Wide--

It is important that lunch account balances be maintained as a positive amount. Once an account reaches \$5.00 the family/student will be notified that the account is getting low. Negative balances of \$10 for an individual account or \$20 for a family account will result in an alternate but approved meal being served to the student until the account is brought to a positive balance.

High School--

• Students at the Jr-Sr High School may select the foods for their plate. Students that receive free or reduced price meals MUST take a qualified meal to receive the meal at the free or reduced price. A qualified meal consists of:

BREAKFAST; 3 of 4 offered food groups: milk, fruit/juice, grain, protein (2 grains may be taken if offered)

LUNCH: 3 of 5 offered food groups: milk, fruit/juice, grain, vegetable, protein.

If students select only specific food items that do not meet qualified lunch status, the items will be charged to the student's account at regular price.

Lunchline employees are not to be aware of which students receive free or reduced price meals. Students who are unsure which foods to select should take the full standard meal each time in order to meet the qualified meal status.

- Students should deposit funds in their lunch account in the cafeteria between 7:50 a.m.-8:10 a.m.
- The ala carte line is a privilege and available to only those students with positive account balances. Students that are on free or reduced lunches must also have a positive balance in their lunch account. With parent approval students may then purchase from the ala carte line using their account or pay in cash.

New Email for Staff

All staff members at the school district have been assigned new email addresses. The standard format is firstname.lastname@se-warren.k12.ia.us. Please change this information in your email address book if applicable.

Email messages coming in to the old address will be forwarded to the new one, for now. Eventally the old addresses will be discarded.

Athletic Physicals

Students participating in athletics must submit a school physical form, SIGNED BY A PARENT OR GUARDIAN. Athletes are also required to have health or accident insurance. Physical forms are available at Indianola physicians' offices, on the school website, or at the high school.

Open Enrollment

Parents/guardians considering the use of the open enrollment option to enroll their child/ren in another public school district in the state of Iowa should be aware of teh following dates:

March 1, 2008: last day for regular open enrollment requests for the 2008-2009 school year.

September 1, 2007: Last date for open enrollment requests for entering kindergarten students for the 2007-2008 school year.

Parents/buardians of open enrolled students whose income falls below 160% of the federal poverty guildelines are eligible for transportation assistance. This may be in the form of actual transportation or a reimbursement paid directly to you.

Parents should be aware that open enrollment may result in the loss of athletic eligibility.

INTERMEDIATE SCHOOL

Cindy Butler, Principal

Another school year — isn't it great! It is a chance for each child to spend the day learning, creating, and sharing. As educators, we look forward to the day the students come in with their bright shiny faces, their new clothes and shoes, and the question, "What will we learn this year?"

At the intermediate school, we have established three learning priorities for the year:

- Concept Oriented Reading Instruction (CORI)
- · Saxon math
- Anti- bullying

Our first priority, Concept Oriented Reading Instruction, was implemented last year in just the fifth grade science and social studies classes. This program emphasizes reading strategy instruction and applying those strategies while reading nonfiction texts. All the ad-

ditional reading instruction takes place while studying grade level science and social studies concepts. All classroom teachers received the training this summer and will implement CORI in their science or social studies classes. Teachers will meet weekly and during early out days to continue to learn and study the CORI procedures designed to improve student learning.

Our second priority is math instruction. Saxon math curriculum has served our district well for nine years as seen in our students' ITBS and MAP math scores. However, our math books were falling apart and needed replaced. We ordered new Saxon math books, and they arrived prior to the start of school. Although the same company publishes the curriculum we previously used, it has been updated so both the teachers and students will have new things to learn.

Our third priority is to make our school a safe place. Recently our School Board adopted a new Anti-Bullying/Harassment Policy, which you will find in the district portion of the student handbook. All teachers and staff will receive training to help them recognize and respond to bullying behaviors. Students will be taught what is and is not appropriate behavior, so that we can eliminate all bullying or harassment from our building.

So when the students ask, "What will we learn this year?" We will have an answer, or to put it another way – it looks to be another busy school year!



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PRIMARY SCHOOL Charlotte Weaklend, Principal

We're well launched into the 07-08 school year! Thanks to everyone who attended our Open House on the evening of August 21st. The PK-3 staff enjoyed the opportunity to meet their new students and families before the school year actually began. Representatives from both the Boys' Scouts' and the Girls' Scouts were here to encourage enrollment in their respective groups, as was a representative from Warren County Health Services to provide a Health Resources Fair. Thanks to the Partners in Education group for providing cookies and a cold drink for this important event. I'd like to welcome several new regular staff members to our ranks. Tricia Dyer has joined us as our K-3 physical education instructor. Jamie Harvey is working as a one-on-one associate. Howard Phippen joined us from the high school late last school year as our lead custodian, and Verl Young is now working a couple of hours each evening to complete the daily cleaning duties. Joyce Blum, who served our district last year as a substitute associate, has become a regular daycare employee this year.

Our building and grounds look great with our newly resurfaced staff parking lot and bus drive, thanks to the penny sales tax initiative. Another chain-link fence was also added to the west side of the playground, providing us with a completely enclosed play area for the children. Initial quotes for

Associate Subsitutes Needed

The Milo Primary School is in need of community members who wish to substitute as a one-on-one associate. Associates are assigned to individual students and assist them throughout the school day. They attend the student's regular classes, PE, art and music, assist them at lunchtime and recess, and accompany them until they are picked up or loaded onto their bus after school.

Hours are generally 7:45 a.m to 3:45 p.m. The position pays \$7.00 per hour with paychecks issued once a month.

Substitutes are utilized on an as-needed basis, working as much as several days a week to a few days a month. Sometimes substitutes will be scheduled in advance, but there are also instances where a substitute is needed to cover for illness with little advance notice. However, it is always the choice of the substitute to accept the assignment for that particular day.

The position requires direct contact with students from preschool to 3rd grade. A high school diploma and a background check are also required. If you have patience, confidentiality, a positive attitude and a flexible schedule we are in need of your help. Opportunities for subbing are also available at the intermediate center in Lacona and the high school in Liberty Center.



The Southeast Warren Board of Education met in regular session July 9, 2007, in the technology lab of the Junior/Senior High School building. Board Member Paul Mead called the meeting to order at 5:30 p.m. The following board members were present: Larrie Williams and Jennifer Mihalovich. Ron Miller and John Burrell were absent. Superintendent Dr. Harold Hulleman, Secondary Principal Terry Gladfelter, Transportation Director Joel Mosher and Board Secretary Julie Wilson were also in attendance, along with members from the community.

AGENDA: Dr. Hulleman recommended postponing agenda items (2) Adopt 2008 IASB Legislative Action Priorities, (3) Develop response to Children First Forum recommendations and (8) Adopt resolution to support H.R. 648 until the next board meeting when all board members are present. Motion by Larrie Williams, seconded by Jennifer Mihalovich to table items 2, 3 and 8 until next month and approve the agenda as amended. Ayes: 3.

REPORTS:

<u>Transportation report submitted by Joel Mosher:</u>
We had 36 extra bus trips for the month. The month was spent doing general repairs. I also checked over most of the units in the fleet and made a list of repairs needed for the summer.

Athletic Boosters: Larrie Williams related that the Athletic Boosters are working on the steps at the football field.

CONSENT AGENDA: The following items were on the consent agenda:

Motion by Jennifer Mihalovich, seconded by Larrie Williams to approve the items on the consent agenda. Ayes: 3.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT: Dr. Hulleman reported on the following items:

- 1. The School Administrators of Iowa Annual Conference will be held August 8-9.
- 2. Teachers will report on August 17.
- 3. All-District Employees meeting will be held on August 20.
- 4. The IASB Fiscal Management Conference will be held on July 18.
- 5. DMACC officials would like to have Warren County Superintendents and School Board Members visit the Ames DMACC Career Academy on the either the evening of August 14th or the evening of August 16th.

SUPERINTENDENT'S GOALS: Dr. Hulleman presented the Superintendent's goals for 2007-2008 as follows:

- 1. Work with principals, staff, and students to make the District a safe place to work and to learn, a place where people respect one another, a place where people take responsibility for their actions, a place where people have pride in their work and in their school, and a place in which the community has confidence that teaching and learning are taking place in an organized and disciplined manner.
- 2. Insure that the 2007-2008 budget is balanced.
- Continue to work with the Administrative Team in providing leadership in curriculum and instruction.
- 4. Coordinate schedules with Mr. Gladfelter to insure that an administrator is in the building as many days as possible.
- 5. Conduct a follow-up community survey to the 2005-2006 survey.
- Take a more active role in supervising teachers by conducting classroom walk-throughs on a regular basis.

Dr. Hulleman related that items 1, 2 and 3 are continued goals from the previous year. Items 4, 5 and 6 are new this year. This item will be on next month's agenda for board approval.
